



EASING ANXIETY IN PEDIATRIC PATIENTS

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PLAYFUL SPACES IN MEDICAL OFFICES EASE ANXIETIES FOR YOUNG PATIENTS

Playful interior designs help ease the anxieties of young patients at three pediatric dental practices. Unique, custom office interiors – designed, fabricated, and installed by Worlds of Wow, a Texas interior design company – change dread to delight for the young patients and their parents. FUN ENVIRONMENT LEADS TO LONG-TERM PATIENT RELATIONSHIPS

Grand Parkway Pediatric Dental, Richmond, Texas, is about an hour away from the Texas Gulf Coast. This proximity to the coast is evident in the playful office owned by Dr. Faisal Khan, DDS. Visitors enter a space filled with natural light, vibrant coastal colors, and a welcoming, smiling shark showing off a set of braces. Walls are full of colorful murals featuring popular Disney characters. Young patients hop aboard surfboard-shaped exam tables for routine services and relax in neon-colored examination chairs for treatments.

"First impressions make a world of difference," says Khan. One benefit of a positive first impression is the good impressions support business growth. Parents who know their child is safely entertained have an easier time consulting with the office staff and doctors. Young patients who want to return to the fun dentist office make it easy for the family to develop long-term relationships with that pediatric dental practice.

Khan says the quality of the experience at the office is just as important as the business growth. The unique interior design at Grand Parkway Pediatric Dental provides a better, less stressful visit for young patients.

"We wanted to break out of the cookiecutter design of closed-off rooms and white walls with no color and no excitement," Khan explains. Thanks to his extensive pediatric dental experience, he has observed that solid walls surrounding a plain examination table can be claustrophobic to some young patients, increasing their anxiety.

Surfboard examination tables are placed in a large open space filled with natural light from the large windows. Color and decorative themes from the Texas Gulf Coast and Disney fill the room from floor to ceiling immersing the young patients and parents in a spirit of fun. This makes it easy for families to enjoy their visits to Dr. Khan and his staff.

In South Carolina, Dr. Dorothy Baker, DDS, brought the Lowcountry into her practice, Summerville Pediatric Dentistry, just west of Charleston. "I wanted to have a little bit of the flair of this area in the office design," she explains. Young visitors to the Summerville Pediatric Dentistry office are immediately drawn to a cypress garden, complete with trees, a grinning alligator in the waiting room, a happy hound dog in his house, friendly frogs, and other local wildlife.

"All the animals in our design are local animals," Baker says. Since most of her young patients are from the area, "they know what an opossum looks like. This interior design has a lot of aspects that are familiar to children," she says, as opposed to an unfamiliar medical environment.

The Worlds of Wow designers maximized the impact of the three-dimensional cypress trees by extending the tree canopy onto the ceiling with two-dimensional art. "Continuing the theme from the walls onto the ceilings and floors enhances the sense of being immersed in the story you want to tell in your space," says Kevin Cravens, creative director at Worlds of Wow.

The Summerville Pediatric alligator is a favorite photo opportunity for children's selfie shots for social media posts. The office design provides parents comfortable seating in the shape of cypress logs and stumps, which provides "another great way to create an immersive experience for families," Cravens says.

At Eastern Orthodontics and Pediatric Dentistry in Greenville, NC, pride in the local culture strongly influenced the design, says Jennifer Pope.

Greenville is home to East Carolina University and its mascot the East Carolina Pirates, "so our children's play area is based on a pirate ship," Pope explains. The ship has a colorful, larger-than-life crew of a monkey, octopus, and pig, each playing an instrument. The ship offers space for video games, a television, and a slide that looks like a ship's dock.

Before the Worlds of Wow team developed, built, and installed the design elements, Pope remembers their office was somewhat bland, with muted colors on the walls and floors. "Now, with this design and the vibrant colors, the first thing the children say when they walk in is 'Wow!' They run to the pirate ship, see the slide and the games in the lobby and they almost forget they are at the dentist office," which is what the doctors and staff wanted to achieve.

Dr. Jasper L. Lewis Jr., DDS, MS, started the practice in 1973. His son, Dr. Lee Lewis, DDS – a Jeep enthusiast – has since joined the practice. Worlds of Wow designers were able to incorporate this personal interest by including a life-size Jeep, equipped with surfboards, in the orthodontics side of the lobby.

CALM COLORS HELP TO CALM PATIENTS

Khan, Baker, and Pope explain the custom design elements are carried through their entire office spaces, becoming more calming and soothing as the patients and parents enter the exam and treatment areas.

At Eastern Orthodontics and Pediatric Dentistry, for example, they continue the pirate sea voyage theme in quiet rooms, or spaces that allow patients to relax. These rooms get plenty of natural light from large windows and feature elements of sea voyages. One offers a quiet under-the-sea space while the other room distracts anxious children with the night sky, allowing the children to imagine following the stars and planets just like the ancient mariners.

Panels of soundproofing material in pleasing colors help to muffle sounds and help ease anxieties.

Baker points out the colors used throughout the design at Summerville Pediatric Dentistry are "almost borderline spa colors," such as tranquil blues and greens.

Khan says, "When our patients are in the waiting room, they see a lot of colors. Those colors become calmer as we move into the examination areas" with the surfboard examination tables.



COLOR IN CHILDREN'S SPACES

Red

Anger, love, passion, and power are typically related to the color red. When using the color red in a children's space, it is best to use it with other colors, so a child isn't overstimulated. When the right combination of different colors and red is achieved, it can help children with detail-oriented or repetitive tasks.

Pink

Pink is a calming color associated with kindness and nurturing. Some studies suggest that the feelings associated with pink occur only during the initial exposure.

Yellow

Yellow represents happiness, energy, warmth, and attention. Soft yellows increase concentration, while more intense shades help with memory and boost metabolism. But be careful with how much yellow is used in space. Too much yellow can be overwhelming and even stressful for children.

Orange

Similar to the other warm colors, orange creates feelings of energy, enthusiasm, happiness, and attention. In children, orange enhances critical thinking and boosts memory. However, some children are overwhelmed and feel it's too bright.

Blue

Productivity, calmness, sadness, and stability are a few feelings brought on by blue. Blue is one of the most popular colors, especially with little boys. It is a calming color, which makes it a great choice to use in rooms to help ease anxiety. Using too much blue can depress or invoke feelings of sorrow.

Green

Green is the most relaxing color for the eyes. It is the color of nature, luck, safety, and envy. Using green in interior design is a great choice for all ages. Green has a soothing effect that can increase concentration and reduce anxiety.

Purple

Purple is the color of imagination. It is rarely seen in nature, so some feel it's mysterious. It can also represent wealth and royalty. Purple is an appropriate color for preschool rooms to enhance creativity and calmness.

CAUSES OF ANXIETY IN YOUNG PATIENTS

Children begin to become aware of doctor visits around the age of three to six years, Pope says. These young children may equate the visit to the dentist with the visit to the doctor, Baker explains. "A lot of kids are getting tubes in their ears or have tonsil issues and they're getting nasal scopes. They go to the pediatrician for normal vaccinations. Then they come to our office and immediately assume that we're going to do something invasive."

Pope agrees, saying the Eastern Orthodontics and Pediatric Dentistry team members clearly understand that "with dentistry, we are in their personal space. Your mouth is your personal space. The children are in a vulnerable position and they can't back away." Khan says distractions such as television monitors on the ceiling and music can help to divert the attention of the young patients during the examination or procedures. He has also been known to sing with his patients to ease their nerves.

Parental anxiety or stories from older siblings about "getting a shot" may increase the anxiety in young patients, which is why these attention diverting designs and other anxiety-relieving techniques are so important to quality care.

PRE-VISIT TOURS, GAMES AND POSITIVE WORDS REDUCE STRESS


Parents are encouraged to show their children what to expect from a trip to the dentist. Khan, Baker, and Pope encourage parents and children to tour the pediatric dentistry office, either virtually or in person. Knowing what to expect, well before the appointment, dispels the fear of the unknown.

Each practice maintains a robust website with office photos, educational resources, and kid-friendly games and materials to help the parents familiarize their children with dental health.

Pope says, "We encourage parents to be positive and to not use themselves as an example.

Dentistry has come a long way since we were children."

The team at Eastern Orthodontics and Pediatric Dentistry uses new words for dental procedures, such as the dreaded shot. "We don't talk about giving a shot," she explains. "We give the tooth 'sleepy juice' so the tooth will go to sleep."

Each Worlds of Wow design offers spaces that allow these children to participate in play to their level of comfort.

Pope explains that Eastern Orthodontics and Pediatric Dentistry has created a "storyboard for children with autism and other special needs. It starts with a picture of the outside of our building and then shows them our lobby. The storyboard shows them the whole dental process so they know what it will be like."

At Grand Parkway Pediatric Dental, Khan schedules office visits for special needs children during quieter office hours. Fewer patients and parents in the lobby allow for more physical space for patients with mobility devices, such as wheelchairs, to maneuver more comfortably.



Medical offices can be sterile, which can scare and intimidate children. An intentionally designed office can feel welcoming and remove the dread of return visits. Creating a space that makes kids feel excited can make a huge difference in how they take care of their own health and their willingness to attend appointments.

Fun distractions can help kids leave their stresses and nerves at home. Distractions can be combined with calming themes and elements so patients aren't overwhelmed. Underwater and nature-themed spaces are relaxing for the whole family. Kids stay at ease and are entertained, and so are adults.
